Transportation

- Change to Multi-Modal Level of Service Standards

Building on the identified sidewalk, bike lane, and trails










Parks, Recreation, Open Space, and Trails

- The Parks, Recreation, and Open Space (PROS) Plan was adopted in 2022
- The draft Trails Plan was prepared concurrently with the updated Transportation Plan and for consistency with the PROS Plan goals and policies











Capital Facilities Plan





- The Capital Facilities Plan includes updated water, sewer, and stormwater utility plan, updates to the municipal campus needs and incorporates the PROS plan by reference
- Modeling for the facilities is based on the draft Future Land Use Plan
- The CTP includes a capital improvement plan of the multi-year financing plan that is updated regularly with the budget.



Future Land Use Map

- Begin where the City ended in 2015
- Inputs:
 - Amendments to the GMA and adopted PSRC Vision 2050, Regional Transportation Plan, and Economic Strategies
 - 2020 Census and WA Office of Financial Management Population Forecast
 - 2021 Adopted Snohomish County Buildable Lands Report (BLR)
 - Snohomish Countywide Planning Policies (prepared through the Snohomish County Tomorrow process) – Initial 2044 Population, Housing, and Employment Allocations
 - New requirement for Housing Units by Income





Future Land Use Map Cont.

- Inputs continued:
 - Phase I Public Engagement Open House, community events, on-line survey, etc.


Outputs:

- Draft Land Use Scenarios presented to the CAC, Planning Commission, City Council between September and November 2023. The City Council approved the land use scenarios for the environmental review process on 11/28/2023
- Action Alternative for the Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (Draft SEIS), May 2024
- Draft Future Land Use Map presented to Council, Boards and Commissions in summer 2024
- Phase II Public Engagement Open House, community events, on-line survey, etc.




2015 Adopted Future Land Use Map

2015 Comprehensive Plan Land Use Designations

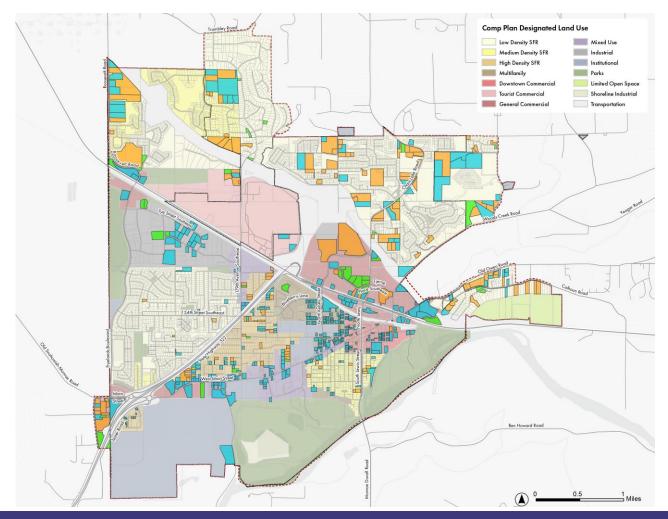

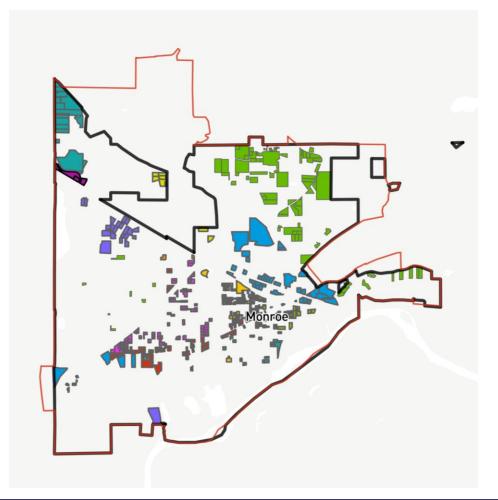




Scenario Planning – Baseline Analysis










DRAFT Future Land



GMA – Environmental Review

- Determination of Significance and Scoping
- Issued Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) on 5/14/2024, public meeting on 6/5/2024, comment period ended on 6/14/2024
- Issued Final SEIS on 10/18/2024
- Future Land Use Map (FLUM)
 - Accept draft proposed FLUM SEIS process is complete
 - If changes to FLUM are recommended at the public hearing then SEIS Addendum required and may extend adoption timeline



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
